Dear Governor Mills, Commissioner Lambrew, and Dr. Shah:

We are a network of over 300 Maine families, professionals, and community members who share the common goal of promoting awareness and acceptance of people with Down syndrome.

We appreciate the challenges that are inherent in the task of making decisions that will be in the best interest of the entire population in our state. However, we are deeply concerned that moving Maine's vaccine eligibility to a strictly age-based system is neglecting to recognize a quietly vulnerable group: our community members who are living with Down syndrome.

The current life expectancy for our family and friends who have Down syndrome is only ~ 60 years, nearly 19 years less than the general population. Placing young adults with Down syndrome at the end of the list based solely on their age overlooks much of what we know about their lifespan, aging process, health, and medical needs, including those related to COVID-19.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has cautioned that "having Down syndrome increases your risk of severe illness from COVID-19" (CDC, 2020). There is a growing body of scientific evidence that people who have Down syndrome are at significantly higher risk of dying from COVID-19 than the general population. One study found that the risk of death from COVID-19 for a 40-year-old person with Down syndrome was equal to the risk of an 80-year-old person who does not have Down syndrome (Trisomy 21 Research Society, 2020). Another study of eight million individuals, over 4,000 of whom had Down syndrome, found that "the hazard ratio for COVID-19-related death for individuals with Down syndrome (versus without) was 10.39 (CI, 7.08 to 15.23), after adjusting for age, sex, ethnicity, BMI, dementia diagnosis, care home residency, congenital heart disease, and a range of other comorbid conditions and treatments" (Clift et. al., 2020).

We respect your commitment to basing Maine's pandemic response on the best available science, and understand that when calculating risk for the general population, grouping by age may matter most. We urge you to look at the medical evidence about our citizens with Down syndrome that shows they are a distinct group, with a different lifespan, and a significantly higher level of risk if they contract COVID-19.

Providing vaccines for this group exclusively by age is not an equitable approach: younger adults who have Down syndrome will remain vulnerable for months longer than many fellow citizens who have a much lower risk of serious complications or death.

Governor Mills has made it clear that our most important mission throughout this pandemic is to "save lives and protect Maine's most vulnerable people." We are asking our state's health leaders to learn more about our citizens who have Down syndrome, and to examine the medical evidence that clearly demonstrates the need for these important members of our community to be protected. 


